# 2008 National 10KM in Athenry

### **Some Personal Thoughts - James Lundon**

After a number of unsuccessful applications, Athenry AC secured the right to hold the 2008 National 10KM Road Race Championship back in late-2007. Firstly, we got over the 2007 Fields before beginning to concentrate our minds on the job at hand in late-April though!



Thankfully, the organisational effort was a lot less for a National 10KM than it would be normally for a Fields 10KM. The club would not have to worry about entries, about the logistics of the finish line or about the results generation process, all of them stressful in their own right. All we in the club had to do on this occasion was to provide a properly-measured & safe course, which we did by slightly altering our usual 10KM course. This was done by taking the level crossing out of play as we couldn't guarantee its complete availability for the whole duration of the race. TJ Beatty did the necessary measurement job, with Colm Moorehead as his helper, in early March. We had to provide an adequate HQ, with the Presentation Convent doing the honours as before. And the necessary catering afterwards, of course! We also provided a specially-commissioned race booklet for this very special occasion.

### It was nearly 50 years since Athenry had last held a national athletic championship and we wanted to do it right.

The day of the race was cloudy but dry. The race started around the 9.5KM mark on the existing Fields course at the alloted time and then proceeded in under the new finish line at ADC House and back out the Tuam Road on the existing Fields course. Three hundred and fifty plus athletes lined up - almost double the average number of competitors for this national championship over the previous 8 years of its existence. The race itself worked like clockwork. The stewarding was obvious and proficient. The water stops were present but those helpers were probably

not run off their feet due to the profile of runners present :-). There were even some spectators on the roadside, who gave all of us ample encouragement. It might be the only time I'd ever get to really race my own course as I've never run in a Fields race to date - have always been in the backroom during that race helping out, as has Mick Rice. Peter Delmer was left run the first Fields but not since!

The race finish was perfectly positioned. The road was fully cordoned off and finishers could mill around in freedom behind the wide finish line. That I was beaten to the line by a 67 year old man was no dishonour, especially when his name happened to be Brian Geragthy (GCH)! The elusive 40 minute barrier still eludes me but I did see 'heaven' for just two seconds: as I turned to come up the finishing straight I was able to spy 39:5X on the finish line clock. It wasn't enough, as I thought might be the case beforehand. I have been very close (40:09) before and know what I have to do to get under 40. Doing "it" is a different matter though!

It took me a while to recover my breath afterwards but it helped that my lady wife was there to welcome me. After some perfunctory photos, we all adjourned to the Presentation Convent HQ for a fuller debriefing. Again, I feel that we did the club proud with the refreshments and arrangements offered to all there. A short while later, the presentations took place and the event was soon over. All that was left was the clean-up, which was quickly undertaken - many hands do make for light work. I didn't have to worry about producing a result, or the multitude of other tasks necessary to close off a race, on this occasion. Heaven, indeed.

## Athenry's Championship **Tradition**

Although they've been few and far between, Athenry has hosted National Athletics Championships before. As far back as 1958, the great success of Athenry's famous near-neighbours, Derrydonnell AC, brought the NACA senior and junior cross-country championship to Mellows College near Athenry. On that great day, the legendary Willie Morris scooted home to victory over home turf to the cheers of friends, neighbours and club mates to claim his third senior cross-country title.

A few short years later, in April 1962 Athenry hosted the revival of the National 15 Road Race Championships. The race was once more hosted by the Derrydonnell club and it was an ambitious venture indeed. Their ambition was rewarded yet again with another 'home' win when the redoubtable Mick Molloy trumped the field with an audacious display of power running.

In 2008 the tradition was revived when Athenry AC hosted the AAI National 10k Road Championships. On that occasion the home club couldn't quite maintain their record of having produced the race winner, but they came darned close when local-hero Paul McNamara was just beaten to the post by the Clare champion Seamus Power.

Of all of these races, perhaps the most resonant today is Mick Molloy's victory over 15 miles back in 1962. That race is described in a book published last year 'In Their Bare Feet', written by Athenry AC Chairman Mick Rice in the follow extract:

#### **Mollov Shines at Athenry Road Race Revival**

Derrydonnell hosted the revival of the All-Ireland 15-Mile Road Race Championship on April 29. The race started in Athenry at 3:00 p.m. from where the runners made their way out to Derrydonnell and then on to Craughwell Bridge before returning to Athenry. It was an ambitious venture for the club and a high-quality field was anticipated with entries received from clubs like Tullamore Harriers, Kilmallock AC, Regional AC, Meelick AC, Kerry AC, Inchicore AC, Brothers Pearse AC, Portlaoise AC, St. Mel's AC, Laught AC and Tuam AC. Mick O'Sullivan of Limerick AC, who held the championship title, was also entered to make a defence of his crown.

When the action started O'Sullivan shot into an early lead, but was over taken after only half a mile by

Mick Molloy. At the five mile mark Molloy had 200 yards to spare over Mick Sullivan but he kept piling on the pressure. By 10 miles, he had extended his lead to 600 yards and with a mile remaining he was over 800 yards clear of his nearest challenger. By the time he arrived back in Athenry Mick Molloy was even further clear of the field. Mick Sullivan ran a game race to remain in second place and Noel Henry of the St. Mel's club in Longford followed him in. Willie Morris was next Derrydonnell man home in fourth and Tommy Madden placed sixth. Derrydonnell AC claimed the team prize by a wide margin, no small achievement given the standard of the opposition on the

Molloy raced into the lead at the end of a half a mile and began to open a big gap between himself and the rest of the field. At the five mile mark he was 200 yards ahead. At the miles he was 600 yards ahead. With a mile to go he had over 800 yards to spare but not content with that he had made the margin of victory still wider at the tape.

Mick Sullivan of Kilmallock A.C. finished second, Noel Henry, St. Mel's, Longford, third, and with Willie Morris and Tommie Madden fourth and sixth respectively Derrydonnell A.C. easily took the team award.

# Galway AAI County Board – Who and What is it?

The Galway AAI County Board will not be familiar to most who aren't themselves involved in the running of their own club, or who are not intimately involved in the organization of athletics – both juvenile and adult – in the county of Galway!

It is comprised of representatives of all registered Athletic Association of Ireland (AAI) or Athletics Ireland (AI) clubs and elects its own executive to conduct the business of ensuring that athletics in the county is run to the utmost high standards. Currently, there are 12 registered clubs in the county and 2500+ registered athletics. In alphabetic order they are: Athenry, Ballinasloe & District, Castlegar, Club Lúthchleasaíochta Chonmara (new in 2011), Clare River Harriers, Corofin, Craughwell, East Galway, Galway City Harriers, Loughrea, South Galway (new in 2011) and Tuam. Galway currently possesses three of the top 10 largest clubs under the aegis of Athletics Ireland, in Galway City Harriers (800+), Craughwell (700+) and Athenry (370+).

Later in the autumn, it's cross country time with two full days (two weeks apart) given over to the 'odd' (under 9 to 19) and 'even' age (under 10 to 18) events. The adult cross country championships are attached to one of these two juvenile dates depending on scheduling. The hosting of these championships are distributed amongst the clubs, with Loughrea hosting the even ages (including adult) on their famous old sod in Bushfield while Mrs. Bane's field in Athenry hosted the odd ages this year. In recent years, these championships have been in Tuam as well as Craughwell and Dangan. Clubs take great pride in taking turns to host these cross country events! The County Board also hosts the incredibly successful Primary Schools Cross Country Championships each late-September in Renmore.



The county board organises a range of official county championships each year, starting with the indoors in January (usually in Nenagh, but with Athlone now opening this might change) which is mostly juvenile centric. The focus moves onto Track & Field during May and June with two sets of very exciting championships, two Saturdays for juveniles, with under 9s to 11s on their own while the under 12s to 19s get their own date a few weeks later. (The older juvenile relays may run on a third evening depending upon demand.) The adult Track & Field championships have been given a new lease of life in the past number of years with Paul McNamara and latterly Brendan Glynn doing trojan work to make these three Thursday evenings in June both competitive and inclusive. These championships are spread out to allow the same people run in the different middle-distances races across different evenings. These championships are always run on the track in Dangan.

This year over 1050 children from 3rd to 6th class took part of the four races, almost 250 in each event. The incredible success of this event has created problems unforeseen even three years ago: the event may have to have qualifiers as we cannot deal with a further increase in interest.

The county board also sanctions a number of road race county championships each year, with the Craughwell 10M and Claregalway 10km being the designated county championship races in 2011.

The board also deals with the permitting of road races in the country, which has exploded in both scope and complexity in the last few years, from what was once only a few years ago a very low base. When Athenry AC's Fields started a mere 9 years ago, there were only four (Streets, Claregalway, Loughrea and the Connemarathon) or possibly five other road races taking place in the county. In 2011, the county board (see article









elsewhere here) permitted over 60 different road races in the county. Yes, SIXTY! Races from ONE mile to ONE HUNDRED miles were permitted locally, once adequate race plans, measurement certificates and insurances were provided. Such permitting is very much sought after for a variety of practical reasons. The oversight of the Galway AAI County Board in this area is one of the reasons why road racing is at such a high ebb in this county at the moment and long may it continue.

The county board convenes six or seven meetings plus AGM a year where the clubs come together to discuss its affairs, deal with permit applications and to organise the county championship events. It also acts as a forum for people like our own Paul McNamara (Athenry AC) to come and discuss

that our county championships can use. For instance, there are plans to purchase an electronic timing system, which will be a real boon for short distances sprinters in the county. And also various monies from the Local Sports Partnership have also been injected into the Galway AAI County Board in recent years.

At the board's recent AGM, James Lundon was re-appointed secretary for a 4th year while Michael Tobin (Craughwell AC) finds time in his incredibly busy schedule to continue in his role as treasurer for a second year. Andrew Talbot (CRH) was imposed upon for a second year to oversee us all in his role as chairman. Mark Davis is PRO for a third year and does excellent work in ensuring that the 'good news' is spread amonast the



what the governing body is doing to advance athletics nationally and locally.

Initiatives such as Fit4Life is one very obvious manifestation of this work between national and local and has proven to be wildly successful in the Galway context. Who in the county hasn't been touched by this wonderful movement over the last five or six years? Paul is the full-time Regional Development Officer for this area and works tirelessly in spreading the gospel of athletics hereabouts.

The Galway AAI County Board has been incredibly lucky to be the recipient of the proceeds of the Galway 5km Series surplus for the last number of years, thanks to Mick Rice and his committee of organising clubs. This has injected much needed funds into the County Board, which is being used to further strengthen the basis on which the athletic clubs operate in the county. It has been used to provide funding to allow county teams compete in the National League and is also being utilised to upgrade the equipment

media, which in these diffused 'web media' days is not nearly as easy or straightforward as it might seem. People like PJ Coyle (GCH), Brendan Monoghan (Tuam) and Margaret Walsh (South Galway) are also involved in the County Board. Tom Finnegan (Craughwell) and David Evans (Tuam and Galway's only representative on a AAI/Al national committee) are some of the board's remaining strong links to a pre-web-&-pre-current-running-boom time and always act as steadying influences in ensuring that we learn from our history when making decisions or taking appropriate actions.

The Galway AAI County Board is always interested in hearing new voices and prevailing on fresh man/woman power to advance all our clubs' objectives. A strong county board leads to strong clubs and vice versa. It's your club, it's your county board – we would love to hear from you. 

- The Senior Section was founded in 2002 with just three members, James Lundon, Mick Rice and Peter Delmer and has since grown to around 250 members. The club has no facilities of its own but organises a vibrant schedule of training sessions, outings to races all over the country and social events that bind the ever-growing membership together. The club have organised a Saturday morning training session from the local church carpark without missing a single week since the founding of the senior club over 10 years ago.
- The juvenile club and the 'Senior Section' are organised in parallel.... both are very active but organised separately – separate committee, AGM etc.
- The senior club's members concentrate mainly on road-running and cross-country but also support local T&F events. Juvenile section has been organised for many years before that and their most famous graduate to date has been Paul Hession.

- The club has produced two Olympic sprinters, Martina
  MacCarthy, who is from Oranmore and Paul Hession who hails
  from Ballydavid, just outside the town itself. MacCarthy
  represented Ireland in the women's 4 x 400 metres relay at the
  Sydney games and Hession competed in the 200 metres at the
  Beijing and London games.
- Senior club member Paul McNamara has represented Ireland at the World and European Cross-Country Championships on a number of occasions and has one National Short-Course Cross Country title and two National 10k championships to his credit.
- A number of members are interested in Ultra-marathon running.
   Valerie Glavin is national record holder for 24 hours
   (217.908km) and won the Connemara 39.3 Ultra Marathon in

2009. Mick Rice has won the Connemara 100 Mile road race for the last 4 years. Ruthann Sheahan has been selected to represent Ireland in the 2012 World and European 24 Hour Championships.

- The Fit 4 Life section of the club has proven a great success and has attracted a large number of new members to the club over many years.
- The club's web-site www.AthenryAC.com is one of the most visited Athletics Club web-sites in the country.
- Athenry AC was chosen by Athletics Ireland as the Connacht Club of the Year in 2010 at the National Athletics Awards in November of that year.
- The club hosted a very successful edition of the National 10km Road Race Championships in 2008 and will host the Woodie's DIY National Half Marathon in September this year.
- Club member and Chartered Physiotherapist Jane Ann Healy is a member of the Athletics Ireland Carded team that travelled to London recently to work with Irish athletes.
- The club's annual road race, 'The Fields of Athenry 10km' is held each St. Stephen's day is one of the most popular athletics events in the western calendar, and attracts upwards of 1,000 athletes to the town each year.
- The club sends a large contingent to the Dublin Marathon each year. In 2011, 32 club members lined up for the Dublin race.
- Evan Quirke, 14, of Presentation College, Athenry, and Athenry
  AC took the gold medal at the Junior Boys Long Jump at the
  All-Ireland Schools Track and Field Championships on June 2nd.
  The championships were held in Tullamore and Evan won the
  competition with a personal best jump of 5.78m (a fraction
  under 19 feet).



It's hard to believe now but for a few years, we were lucky to get three or four people at the weekly Church car park run on Saturday at 9 am. (And we mean 9 am sharp, okay?). Sometimes you were even on your own, a disappointment after rising earlyish on a sleep-in day with rain pelting down your windows.

But, as we all know, if there is one thing that pays off in running it is perseverance. The street corner boys gaped and sniggered a bit but word got around and numbers grew. We saw them in the shops you see, we saw them in the pubs, the schools, on the treadmill in gyms. We even saw them in the Church car park...on their way to mass! (Multiple offers of a loan of running shorts and tops were declined). We did have one female from the start -- thank you Bridget Anne -- and some few brave others but they were the exception that proved the rule: the fair sex wanted no part of us.

We debated it at AGMs. Should we smile more at girls during our training runs? (too threatening), shave our legs? (too sore),

enter the Mini-Marathon in bras? (too awful to consider). But God smiled on us. It didn't seem to be any one factor but somehow a few came, and a few led to more, and...Fit4Life started. A shaft of sunlight had broken through the dark cloud overhanging Athenry and shown the way. In no time, women became a majority of members. Amen.
